Food from the Heart (FFTH) is a non-profit voluntary food distribution programme established in February 2003 when Singapore-based Austrian couple Henry and Christine Laimer decided to channel surplus food from bakeries to those in need.

Our mission is to reach out to the less fortunate and brighten their lives by alleviating hunger through a food distribution programme and bringing joy through the distribution of toys and birthday celebrations. As we work towards our mission, we embrace the values of professionalism, efficiency, transparency, and self-sustainability.

Our hope is that within these pages you see not only our mission in action, but the passion with which it was accomplished. We are proud of the work that Food from the Heart does, but most importantly, we are in awe of the selfless work that our many partners and volunteers undertake to help their neighbours in need.

Founded by Christine and Henry Laimer in 2003, Food from the Heart has grown into a major charity supporting the needs of underprivileged families in Singapore. Through our various programmes we supply food and emotional nourishment to over 23,000 beneficiaries each month.

Daily collection and distribution of unsold bread from over 100 bakeries and hotels with the help of 1,700 active volunteers on a daily basis. We distribute about 28,000 kg of bread to 153 welfare homes and needy families and individuals – reaching about 14,500 beneficiaries per month.

Distribution of food rations including unsold bread, collected non-perishable food items like canned food, rice, oil, noodles, beverages, even toiletries, and household items. There are 27 centres located across Singapore supporting 4,500 individuals.

Distribution of standardized Food Goodie Bags containing 10 kg of rice, 2 litres of oil, canned food, etc. These food items are given out by teachers to 50 of the needlest students and their families in our partnering neighbourhood schools. Corporations and private donors are encouraged to adopt these schools under the 'Adopt A School' programme. Number of beneficiaries per month: 4,000 individuals in 19 schools.

Other programmes include collection and distribution of toys to 4,000 underprivileged children annually and birthday parties for over 500 children and elderly each month.

Food from the Heart continues to be recognized for the benefits we bring to the community. In 2012, we were finalists in the Charity Council's Charity Governance Awards Programme in the category of small non-profit, voluntary organizations. We were also recertified for IPC status during this year. Our committed and effective Board of Directors are committed to good governance and have decided on several new governance initiatives for 2013 including the establishment of two Board level committees:

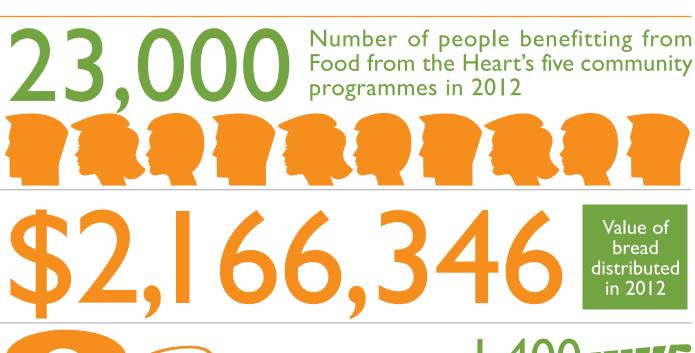
Finance and Audit and Fund Raising.

Overall, the financial performance in 2012 was excellent. Food from the Heart ended the year with a surplus of about \$306,300 which we will use to fund food distribution at additional schools and Self Collection Centres. The market value of the food we distributed during this year was around \$3.12 million or, said differently, for every \$1 we received from donors and sponsors we distributed \$1.83 worth of food.

Special thanks should be given to our donors and sponsors for their continued support.

Also, thanks to our almost 2,000 volunteers who pick up and distribute food and pack Food Goodie Bags at our warehouse, as well as help with the toy drive and birthday parties we hold. Finally, the staff in our office and warehouse deserves special mention for their continued dedication and hard work on behalf of our beneficiaries.

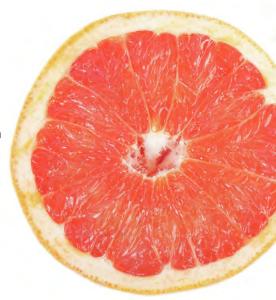

BREAD DISTRIBUTION PROGRAMME

Food from the Heart was conceived with a mission to bridge the gap between hunger and food wastage with the bread programme as its pioneer project in February 2003. With the help of 1,700 active volunteers who are assigned regular routes, Food from the Heart gathers fresh unsold surplus bread and distribute it to over 14,500 beneficiaries from more than 150 welfare homes, senior activity centres, self collection centres and other needy families islandwide.

Food from the Heart's volunteers are a mix of local and expatriate professionals, students, housewives, retirees and blue-collar workers – including more than 50 City Cab drivers, who either deliver the bread themselves or ferry fellow volunteers to delivery points free of charge. Using their cars, motorbikes, vans, public transportation and even on foot, the volunteers take turns to ensure that the bread reaches as many underprivileged individuals as possible.

For this very reason Food from the Heart is dependent on its volunteers for helping to "salvage" these breads, as well as bakeries and major hotels for their partnership to reach out to the needy and at the same time prevent food wastage. Collectively, the hotels and bakeries donated a retail value of approximately \$2,166,346 worth of unsold bread and baked goods in 2012 to help neighbors in need.



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SELF COLLECTION CENTRES

To reach out to the heartlands, Food from the Heart has set up Self Collection Centres across the island to support beneficiaries with essential food items and other rations on a regular basis. Working with residents' committees and family service centres, needy families are identified and supplied with monthly food rations.

To supply the monthly food rations for 27
Self Collection Centres across Singapore,
food drives are held in schools and
corporations, whereby students and staff
are encouraged to donate food items
respectively. This activity helps build
enthusiasm and gets everybody working
towards a common goal. The food items
that are collected in schools and offices are
sorted at Food from the Heart's warehouse
by employees and dedicated volunteers who repack
all the non-perishable donations for easy distribution to
the community.

The monthly food rations make a great deal to families who are struggling to make ends meet and often have to decide between paying their rent, utility bill, or unforeseen medical bill and buying food. Food from the Heart would like to thank all participating schools and corporations for their commitment and generosity that directly benefit the beneficiaries and their families.

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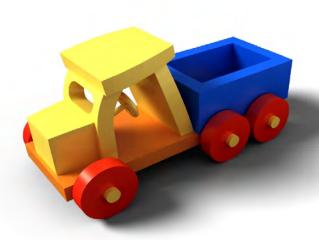
TOYS FROM THE HEART

Most people take for granted that the Christmas tree will be decked with piles of gifts and toys. But many children will never have that luxury. Food from the Heart teams up with corporates, schools and donors to bring special gifts to precious little ones at the annual Toys Buffet event. Especially during the holiday season, a small toy, a teddy bear, or doll can brighten a needy child's life. A simple act of love and compassion, like giving a child a toy, can bring joy and hope to a little one where hope seems lost.

Every year, students from primary schools through secondary schools and tertiary institutions pitch in to help collect and distribute toys, and also play the role of a toy ambassador at the annual Toys Buffet by chaperoning the children beneficiaries at the event. By doing so, they are made aware of the plight of the needy and learn the joys of giving and the value of community service. Corporations are also encouraged to participate by supplying toys and taking up a booth at the event.

While Food from the Heart organizes, coordinates and manages the Toys Buffet, the ultimate success depends on the support of the local community and the generosity of corporations and individuals who donated the toys. All the work that the volunteers put in were appreciated too as they all showed enthusiasm and organization to help make it a fun experience for everyone involved.





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BIRTHDAYS FROM THE HEART

A child's birthday is a very special day, and we believe every child has the right to have it recognized. Its celebration is fundamental to the development of self-esteem, and we know that self-esteem begins at home, and that healthy self-esteem is crucial to a child's ability to develop and learn successfully.

However, for disadvantaged children who are living in poverty or homeless, birthdays pass with little or no celebration due to a family's limited financial resources. There are many children who do not believe they have a birthday, or that they deserve a birthday, as it is never celebrated.

Birthdays from the Heart was incepted in December 2004 with this intention to bring joy to less privileged children and elderly by celebrating their birthdays at monthly birthday parties. Every month, birthday celebrations are held at six welfare homes with specially chosen presents and cakes sponsored by individuals and corporations. The entire event is about self celebration and showing each child or elderly that they are loved, valued and deserve to be celebrated.

We are thankful to corporations, donors and volunteers who kindheartedly sponsor the cakes and joined hands to spread some cheer to the children and elderly who are benefiting from this programme, making their birthday a memorable one.



FOOD GOODIE BAG PROGRAMME



Food from the Heart works with 19 schools across Singapore to identify needy students who are eligible for the Food Goodie Bag programme. Under this programme, over 4,000 students and families receive a monthly goodie bag comprising basic food necessities such as rice, cooking oil, biscuits, beverages and canned food. To qualify for the ration, students must demonstrate good behavior and consistent attendance, and their household income will need to fall below \$450, among other factors.

The donations of non-perishable food items and toiletries to needy students and families has enabled them to reduce a significant amount from their cost of living, at the same time alleviating their financial burdens. Children from these families can now divert their attention to studies with a more stable home environment. In addition, parents of the respective students are required to collect the rations from the school, thus creating a platform for teachers to interact, communicate and provide them with the necessary support and feedback on students' progress and well-being.

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Volunteers represent an integral part of the success of Food from the Heart's ability to reach out to people in need in our community. We welcome and appreciate your time, talents, and commitment to serving those in need.

Full of holiday spirit, staff volunteers from Singapore Post Limited (SingPost) hosted a lunch reception during the Lunar New Year for the elderly residents of Kolam Ayer.

Staff kicked-off the outreach a few days before by helping to pack food goodie bags and household items in support of the needy elderly who lived alone, were in poor health and without next-of-kin.

The senior folks were entertained by performances of the Evergreen Choir and later joined them to sing to the familiar classics. The day left smiles on the faces of volunteers - including the top management from SingPost - to rival the grins on the elderly's faces as they headed home with goodie bags and special holiday memories.









Since July 2008, SingPost and Food from the Heart have been working together to enhance the lives of the needy. Under its staff volunteerism programme, SingPost's staff expend both personal time and money towards the Food Goodie Bag programme, sponsoring, packing and distributing food goodie bags on a quarterly basis to 120 senior citizens staying in one-room flats in Kolam Ayer.

As an extension of its support for Food from the Heart, SingPost has adopted 50 needy students of Evergreen Primary School since June 2009 and is continuing its support year after year. Through the adoption programme, SingPost sponsors monthly food goodie bags for needy families that struggle to make ends meet.

Apart from the Food Goodie Bag programme, SingPost also contributes to the Bread Distribution programme, deploying its fleet of vehicles to collect bread and pastries from hotels and confectioneries, and deliver them to Self Collection Centres three days a week on six routes.

We at Food from the Heart are continually inspired by the dedication and generosity of SingPost who answer the call to give again and again.

CHARITABLE GIVING THE UNITED WAY

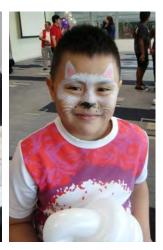
A DECEMBER TO REMEMBER
